# Lands, Resources & Heritage

#### Staffing Update

We have had some changes in the department since the last newsletter. First, we would like to welcome Geraldine back to her role as Director after taking medical leave for the past few months. Welcome back Geraldine! After many years of service to KFN, Kate Ballegooyen and Adam Hicks have departed for other opportunities. Kristy Kennedy has completed her secondment, although she will continue on a contract basis to provide support for the wind project for the short term. During the fall hunting season, we had Sam White on contract in the capacity of wildlife monitor. Thank you, Sam, for your efforts in providing a presence on the land, and documenting activity in KFN Traditional Territory. We will be working to fill the vacancies in the department in the coming weeks and months. Look for postings of new opportunities with LRH to our website and on social media

#### Wildlife Management Plans

YG held community engagement session this fall for updates to the 2010-2015 Management Plan for the Chisana Caribou Herd. The Government of Yukon was tasked with writing updates to the plan for review by the parties. The parties are Kluane First Nation, White River First Nation, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Unites States National Park Service, the Yukon Fish and Wildlife Management Board, the Government of Canada and Government of Yukon. KFN has provided written comments that were incorporated into the draft plan that was discussed at the community meetings. YG has noted the comments from the sessions in Burwash, Destruction Bay and Beaver Creek. They also expect to get a recommendation on the current draft of the plan from the YFWMB. Work is progressing on a management plan for Bison. The consultation stage has ended. The management committee will be reviewing the input and looking to next steps for finalizing and approving the plan.

## Special Management Area Plans

Community consultation sessions were held this fall for the management plans for Asi Keyi Natural Environment Park and Pickhandle Lakes Habitat Protection Area. At this stage, they have identified the vision and principles for theses areas. After reviewing the feedback from the consultation sessions, the steering committees for each will begin next steps in preparing draft plans.

#### Lands Committee Update


Council has appointed three new members to the Lands Committee.

## SMARTICE

SmartICE is returning to Burwash this winter! (February 4th – 8th )

SmartICE was created to address the challenges posed by the changing climate and melting sea ice in the Arctic, which have major effects on the safety of navigation, resource development, and a traditional lifestyle. The program in Burwash aims to improve ice safety and knowledge within the community. Last winter LRH staff tested a device on Kluane Lake which would monitor the thickness of lake ice as it changes over the winter months. This season we are hoping to deploy three of the "SmartBOUY" units during the first week of February which will continue to monitor ice thickness over the winter in frequently used areas. Committee members include Monique Martin (Chair), Diyet van Lieshout, Joyce Johnson-Albert, and Colesen Ford.

We also presented to Council on November 21st and they are supportive of our process and proposed direction.
